Lighting the Lantern with Inspirational Stories

Two immigrants shared their stories of struggle and success at the second annual Lighting the Lantern dinner, Sunday, Sept. 29 at Convivium Urban Farmstead, 2811 Jackson St.

The event raised funds for the Presentation Lantern Center, which welcomes immigrants to Dubuque and the tri-state area. The center offers hospitality, education and advocacy for immigrants and offers weekly tutoring sessions with volunteers in English and citizenship.

More than 1,000 immigrants have learned English, studied citizenship and built bonds with volunteer tutors since the center's founding. Eighty-three students have successfully studied to become U.S. citizens, and the Center has served immigrants from more than 65 countries.

Just as importantly, the center has built immeasurable bonds between native-born and immigrant Dubuquers, nourished friendship and cross-cultural understanding and built confidence for those navigating their new home. As one student described the center, "It changed my life."

Speaking Sept. 29 were Dora Serna of Clarke University. Serna came to the U.S. with limited English and began studying at the Lantern Center with founder Sr. Corine Murray. Serna now boasts a Master's from Clarke, where she also works.

Secondly, Julia Theisen shared her story of coming to Dubuque from Oxford, England in 2002 and becoming a proud U.S. citizen in 2014, after studying at the Lantern Center. She is a selfempowerment teacher and owner and co-founder of local businesses including Body & Soul Salon, Wellness Center and Spa and Inspire Café.
