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Shining a light on financial literacy²

As our intrepid immigrant students navigate the challenging worlds of home, work, school and family in a new country, culture and language, we're reminded that not only English literacy but also financial literacy is integral to their success. United Way has been a significant partner this year in our efforts to help our immigrant students increase financial literacy and build stable, independent and strong finances for the future.

These are long-term goals. Rome was not built in a day, and it often takes months or years of working with individual students for them to achieve big life goals. Nevertheless, we have been thrilled to hear several examples recently of students who have achieved long-time dreams with our coaching and assistance.

Most notably, an immigrant student's family has bought their first house, after

months of multiple meetings and advice along every step of the process, from inspections to mortgages. We are thrilled that they can finally live in a place they can truly call their home!

In the past month, Ben Drury of Dupaco has provided financial literacy presentations to many of our students. On Nov. 7, Ben's plan to present a short lesson on basic financial terms quickly became a full hour of explanation of everything from the concept of a bank to compound interest and how to use a debit card. Our adult English language learners asked many questions, and the answers will help them better navigate life in the U.S. and improve their financial well-being for the future.

The Lantern Center arranged to have Spanish and Pashto translators who could translate Ben's explanations of banking terms sentence by sentence and allow back-and-forth follow-up questions. Our Spanish and Pashto speakers had LOTS of questions for Ben it seems that everyone has questions about money and its management!

Ben plans to return to give more financial literacy lessons, with students specifically asking to learn more about mortgages and budgeting. The conversations continued one-on-one with this animated group of about two dozen, allowing students to learn from each other as well.



Ben Drury of Dupaco Community Credit Union spoke to about two dozen Lantern Center students and tutors about basics of banking, such as the difference between a checking and a savings account.

Our mission is to offer "hospitality, educational opportunities and advocacy to adult immigrants, especially women, who are striving to better their lives." Many of those attending the presentation were women who do not have significant experience managing money. In some cases, they have lacked access to basic education as well. However, EVERYONE who attended, including tutors and experienced English speakers, said they learned something.

Helping people access banking services, manage money, purchase property, save for the future, increase stability and grow their financial resources is truly providing "hospitality, education opportunities and advocacy" to those "who are striving to better their lives!"



Education Highlights

We've had lots of exciting happenings in our tutoring community recently! One student with significant education and professional experience in her home country has now earned a full-time position in her field in the U.S. Another student landed a full-time job that has a much better work-life balance. He makes use of his first language and English as he interacts with the customers and his coworkers.

We have had nine new student pairs in recent weeks! These include a former student who is returning with specific goals related to gaining computer skills and exploring new job opportunities. Another student in Galena who lacks transportation was matched with a Galena-area tutor. Other new students have come to the Dubuque area from Ecuador, Indonesia and Guatemala.

This fall, we were contacted by Loras College regarding tutoring needs of four young men from Burma (Myanmar) that the college had enrolled under unique circumstances. They were matched with tutors and are working on higher level language skills. The pairs also spend some time in their sessions reviewing class assignments.
