

A Story of Courage, Persistance and Hope

Imagine standing in line at a grocery store for 12 hours, hoping to buy basic food for your

family. You work full time, but like most people in Venezuela, your wages can't keep up with soaring prices. Bread is \$12 a loaf, and milk can cost up to \$15 a gallon—if it's even available. After rent and bills, you're left with just \$30 to stretch over two weeks, thanks only to support from family who fled the country.

That was the life for one of our language learners. Faced with poverty and desperate for safety and opportunity, she risked everything. She and her sister used their savings to make the dangerous 2,500-mile journey from Venezuela to the United States. She crossed the treacherous Darién Gap, a jungle filled with deadly animals, raging rivers and violent cartels. Many don't survive the journey. She did.

At the U.S. border, she was able to legally request asylum, a right protected by international law, but the next challenge was just beginning. It takes many months, sometimes years, for an asylum seeker to get a work authorization (i.e., a work permit), if they are ever even granted one by the government. Without legal work authorization, she walked long distances to her jobs—rain or shine—and earned cash by cleaning houses, babysitting and mowing lawns.

She survived thanks to occasional help from friends and the the Lantern Center's Urgent Student Need Fund, supported by generous donors like you. The Center also connected her to counseling services when the weight of her journey led to moments of deep despair.

She spent 125 hours working one-on-one with her English tutor at the Lantern Center. This consistent, caring relationship was, in her words, "the only constant in my life this past year." Through additional English classes and tireless dedication, she reached high proficiency and found a job paying three times the minimum wage.

Now, she not only supports herself but also helps supplement her mother's income in Venezuela, where food insecurity remains overwhelming. Recently, she proudly walked to the Center to hand-deliver her first donation—a crisp \$100 bill—along with a bag of lunch treats for staff. "You saved my life," she said.

Because of your support, we stood alongside 253 immigrants last year, offering 4,878 hours of tutoring, resources and hope. Your generosity funds essential staff, emergency assistance and educational materials that volunteers use to support our students on their journey. In 2025, we expanded our Urgent Student Needs Fund to help immigrants cover critical expenses such as obtaining passports, attending immigration appointments and applying for work permits.

Thank you for being part of this life-changing work.


